HISTORICAL WAIT TIMES

SEATTLE SENIOR HOUSING PROGRAM (SSHP)

Applicants who are at least 62, income eligible and reside within the city of Seattle receive the highest preference points for SSHP waiting lists. The historical wait times below are for SSHP applicants with the highest preference points. Wait times for applicants without highest preference points are unknown. Wait times for properties with no move-outs in the past 2 years are also unknown.

Buildings are reserved primarily for seniors (62+) with fewer units set-aside for adults with disabilities. Waiting times for adults with disabilities who are younger than 62 will experience longer waiting times. Most units are one-bedroom apartments, with a few two-bedroom units. Residents are charged one of several rent tiers, depending on income and the number of bedrooms.
