## NewHolly Community Building Project Funds Eligibility Guidelines

- Project Team Leader and at least three (3) of the Project Team Members must live in NewHolly.
- The Project Team Leader must be at least eighteen (18) years old.
- 3. The project must be legal.
- 4. The project must benefit NewHolly in some way.
- The project request must be between \$100-\$1000.
- 6. The project must be completed within 1 year.
- 7. The project application must be completed and submitted to the Community Building Office. It will then be given to a relevant Committee for review, recommendations, assistance, and support.
- 8. The project must promote at least one of these basic community building principles:

<u>Start from local conditions</u> - There is no cookie-cutter approach to building community; the best efforts flow from and adapt to local realities.

<u>Build on community strengths</u> - Past efforts to improve community life have too often addressed problems or deficits; community building efforts build on local capacities and assets.

<u>Forge partnerships through collaboration</u> - Building community requires work by all sectors – local residents, community-based organizations, businesses, schools, religious institutions, health and social service agencies – in an atmosphere of trust, cooperation and respect. It takes time and committed work to make such collaboration more than rhetoric.

<u>Require racial equity</u> - Racism remains a barrier to a fair distribution of resources and opportunities in our society; our work promotes equity for all groups.

 $\underline{\textbf{Value cultural strengths}}$  - Our efforts promote the values and history of our many cultural traditions and ethnic groups

<u>Foster broad community participation</u> - Many community programs have become professionalized and alienated from the people they serve; new programs and policies must be shaped by community residents.

<u>Support families, children, and seniors</u> - Strong families are the cornerstone of strong communities; community building efforts help families help themselves.

<u>Integrate community development and human service strategies</u> - Traditional antipoverty efforts have separated "bricks and mortar" projects from those that they serve; new programs and policies must be shaped by community residents.

<u>Honor Diversity</u> - Recognize discrimination based on race, sexual orientation, gender, age, religion, national origin or disability and require equal access to all SHA sponsored services and activities.
