

The Older Adult Population in SHA

Size and Make-Up of SHA Senior Population

Currently,² In SHA's owned/managed units, 26% of all tenants are aged 62 or older.³ An additional 8% are in the older adult cohort aged 55 to 61. 26% equals 4,151 individuals.




The senior SHA population in owned/managed units is diverse, and differs in race make-up from both the general Seattle population and overall SHA population in owned/managed.




³ 'Senior' is a non-technical term. 62 is chosen as the cut-off as that is the lowest age for claiming Social Security retirement benefits.




Primary languages other than English are prevalent in our senior population, with the largest known languages being Vietnamese, Cantonese, and Somali.



Reflecting their longer life expectancy, the female population is noticeably larger than the male.









Our senior population is spread across all of our owned/managed portfolios.⁴

However, there are marked proportional differences. In Hope VI/Yesler properties, 12% of the population are 62 or older. In LIPH Hi-Rises the percentage rises to 60%, and SSHP 95%







Our Black seniors are most highly represented in Scattered Sites and Hope VI/Yesler properties; 47% of seniors in Scattered Sites are Black. Asians comprise 52% of Hope VI/Yesler seniors. Whites comprise 69% of SSHP's seniors.

How Our Seniors Live

Without fairly intensive surveying it's difficult to know a great deal substantively about how our seniors live. We do know whether or not they live alone, and this can have a big impact on social and functional aspects of AIP. 72% of the seniors in owned/managed units live in single person households. But the range between portfolios is broad.
