RadioActive is a program of KUOW 94.9 Public Radio.

In this fun, challenging, and hands-on workshop, you'll learn about journalism, audio recording, audio editing, interviewing, script writing, and speaking on the air. You'll gain confidence and leadership skills in a supportive environment while collaborating with other participants to make radio stories and podcasts for KUOW on topics you choose.

This is a PAID opportunity! This workshop is the entry point to RadioActive's advanced producer program, a year-round opportunity to collaborate on youth-led radio productions.

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YOU SHOULD APPLY IF:

- You are 15-18 years old.
- You're excited to use media to tell true stories.
- You're engaged in the world. You're curious and always asking questions.
- You love writing and want to try out telling stories through sound.
- You want to share all sides of the story as a journalist – this workshop is NOT a platform to promote a cause, organization, or point of view.
- You want to try new things – **NO broadcasting or journalism experience is required!**



PROGRAM DETAILS – WHEN & WHERE:

- The workshop runs from **Monday, June 29th - Friday, August 14th, 2020**. There is a mandatory **orientation meeting on Monday, June 22nd**.
- Workshop meetings are Monday-Thursday, 10am-4pm, with half days most Fridays. You may need to put in additional time to complete assignments – expect to work up to 40 hours a week.
- We meet at KUOW on 45th & University Way NE in the University District. KUOW is accessible by multiple bus routes and is a 25-minute walk or short bus ride from the Link Lightrail (UW Station).
- We'll have a public celebration after the last day of the workshop – you'll help plan the party!

EXPECTATIONS:

- Come on time and stay for the whole workshop. **Attendance to ALL meetings is mandatory.**
- Complete work on time (you'll need to do work outside of workshop hours).
- Work on your own and in groups.
- Have fun, be creative, take risks!

WHAT YOU'LL GET:

- Improve your communication skills – writing, listening, and talking to people.
- Build your confidence and leadership skills.
- Work with professional journalists.
- Develop time management skills, and meet deadlines in a professional setting.
- Learn how to give and receive feedback in a collaborative and creative environment.

- Gain mentors to support your career path.

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PITCH US A STORY!

In the RadioActive workshop, you'll learn how to tell TRUE stories using sound. So pitch us a story! That means: propose a story from your life or community that you want to tell, and that other people will want to hear.

What touches your heart, inspires you, confuses you, or makes you mad? What do people need to hear about? Who is someone you want to learn more about? **The best stories are ones that mean something to you. Try to think of a story about someone that you could talk to in person.**

STORY PITCH EXAMPLE *(From a past workshop application)*

My story will be about my mom. What my mom is doing is trying to reteach me and my siblings how to speak and write Somali properly.

My mom is always calling us Somalia's lost generation. She says we came to America too young to have a culture and mother tongue to hold onto and that we need to learn now so that we can pass our culture and language on to our children. I think my story will hold listeners attention because people can relate to losing not only their mother tongue or culture but even family traditions that your parents may have made. We all have things we used to do with our families when we were young that we may have stopped doing, not because we forgot but because we just didn't want to take the time to do it.

I'd interview my mom, students at my high school who also forgot their home languages. The sounds I'd record would be my mother saying a word and me and my siblings repeating it to learn, me and my friends/siblings speaking in broken Somali, my mom and aunts speaking fluently in Somali.

I hope to learn why so many first generation immigrants have a hard time holding on to their culture and ways for us to connect to our cultures and languages without losing what we've learned of American culture and the English language. I want to tell this story because I think people feel ashamed of not being able to speak to their parents or grandparents, and not being able to connect to them the way they could if language/cultural norms weren't different. It's important to talk about the problems in day to day life for immigrants to help ease the process of their moving and to show that there are people like them in the media.

PITCH #1 FOR A TRUE STORY THAT YOU WANT TO TELL ON THE RADIO (Required)

Make sure to cover these points in your pitch:

- **Who** your story is about (Make sure to write about a person, NOT an organization. Try to think of someone you could talk to in person).
- What they are **doing** in your story.
- **Why** they are doing that (their motivation).
- Why do you think your story will **hold listeners' attention**?
- Who will you **interview** and why? What other **sounds** will you record?
